

Letter from the Chair

As the recently elected President of the Half Moon Lake District, let me introduce myself. We purchased Ken Briegal's cabin in 2001, on the southeast side of the lake. Friends told us that it would be available from the family after his death. I was not so sure that I wanted a lake place, as we had previously owned a cabin near Ogilvie, MN that we didn't use much and just didn't love. As it turned out, my wife Jane has a strong connection to this lake, having had friends and activities on Half Moon during her high school years, as well as other more recent friends and relatives on the lake. Lastly "nothing ever comes for sale" on this lake because it always stays in the family. Obviously, we did proceed with the purchase and began to love our new place along with our children and grandchildren. During the past 13 years, we have met and gotten to know, as well as becoming friends, with many people certainly enough to get coerced and elected to this position. In 2006, after many years of thinking and planning, we built a year-round home, which became our permanent residence in 2012 (about a year later than planned). Nothing like getting caught in the economic crash like everyone else.

First, I want to commend all previous board members for their work and diligence in preserving our very high quality lake. Further, all of the property owners are part of this effort to keep our lake waters clean. This does not happen in a vacuum. All are doing their part, and it shows. Again, kudo's for everyone.

The hardest part of this job, I think, will be to "slop" around in the previous "large" shoes, but I promise my best efforts. At this time, we have a lot of good programs in place. Clean boats and clean waters, run by Dan Leh and Rick Miller, required a huge amount of work especially getting it implemented. I know because I volunteered when the District wanted to begin. I quickly realized that it was more than I could handle. My heartfelt thanks to Dan and Rick for all of their work.

In keeping with our preservation efforts, the district has again made a motion to continue adding funds to our reserve. Our fund balance is "proportionally" much less than our neighboring lakes. We believe that it is not "if" we have an invasive species problem, but "when". With clean boats monitoring 7 days a week and a full-time camera during the summer season, it seems that for now, everything that can reasonably be done is in place. Unfortunately nothing will be 100% fool proof, so it is wise to have a contingency in place. Every year, we hear of reports of additional lakes that discover an infestation of a new invasive species. While research is ongoing regarding extermination, there are no really good or really effective treatments. Some Districts and Associations have spent many hundreds of thousands of dollars to achieve little more than slow the spread. Again, thanks to everyone for supporting the efforts, but more importantly, doing their part as well as educating their quests.

At this time, I am unaware of any "Hot Button" issues and do hope that none come up, but our job is to work with and resolve them. Please contact me or any board member if there is a concern or perceived lake issue.

To conclude, "quality of Life" at our lake means different things to different people. It is important to respect our neighbors, as well as neighbors to respect us, as we enjoy our exceptional retreat as it is "special" to all of us.

We wish you all a warm, safe, winter and look forward to seeing and/or hearing from you all in the spring.



4 Loon Report

FALL 2014 LOON REPORT

Fortunately, for the second year in a row, the two loon chicks hatched on the north end of our lake have survived the summer. These chicks are precocial, able to dive and swim right away. By the time they are 11 to 12 weeks old, they are able to gather almost all their food and are beginning to fly. Their parents left our lake to fly south to the Gulf of Mexico for the winter sometime between September 8th and 14th. The chicks will remain on our lake gaining strength for their long trip south until late October or early November.

One of the cabin owners at the lakeshore meeting asked the question whether or not loons molted. Unable

to answer the question, I investigated and learned that towards the end of summer, adult loons begin molting into their winter plumage. Both male and female loons have identical plumage. The first signs of molting show up on the face around the bill as the black feathers are lost and replaced with white ones. The loon's throat and chin become white to match their belly while the black feathers on their backs are replaced with grayish brown ones. The eyes also turn brown. If you look closely at our adult loons, they began this change around the first of September; their backs are not nearly as black and the white spots are more indistinct. They do not lose their flight feathers but continue to molt while migrating to the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. In the spring before returning north, they begin molting back into their breeding plumage and are completely flightless for 2 to 3 weeks during this period.



It has been another great year of boating and Inspecting at the boat launch. The Ilids camera will be removed soon and our inspectors are gone until next season. Besides Josh and Charlie Hatton we added another new inspector Sam Butler. Sam lives just off the south side of Half Moon Lake and is a welcome addition to the team.

You may have seen this year's addition to the boat launch, the "Kids don't float" kiosk that offers free use of life jackets for those who forgot to bring them. There are jackets for kids and adults to borrow. Thank You Wisconsin DNR!

A big thank you to Dan Hale for placing the much needed danger buoys at the entrance to mark the rock dangers. Dan has consistently taken the lead on this initiative and has volunteered his time to do so.

Another big thank you to Rick Miller and daughter Sarah. They have again taken the lead for the Weed Rangers and are training and inspecting the lake for Aquatic Invasive Species. Please reach out to Rick if you would like to assist in this effort.

We wrapped up the 3 year CBCW grant on December 31, 2013 that offered us a chance to buy the Ilids camera and start the trailer inspections at the launch. I am pleased to report that the Wisconsin DNR approved our tracking paperwork and cut use a check for \$10,000 in free money for our efforts. Thank you to all who assisted this endeavor including Josh Hatton, Charlie Hatton, Mike McMahon, Dan Hale, Eric Lindberg from Environmental Sentry and Pat McMahon who listened to my griping when I complained how much paperwork the state required. Overall it was well worth the effort and the lake has certainly been educated on Aquatic Invasive Species. Let's keep the momentum going.




YARD CLEANUP AND WATER QUALITY




2014 Water Quality Report

Since 1993, volunteers have been measuring Half Moon Lake's water quality and contributing data to the Wisconsin Citizen Lake Monitoring Network. This summer, Erin Balestri (daughter of Sarah and Dave Balestri) conducted tests on water clarity, temperature, and dissolved oxygen. She also took samples for chemical testing (phosphorous and chlorophyll), but we were unable to get the refrigerated sample to the state lab on time. The results of this year's tests follow.

Water Clarity:

The water clarity is tested in the deepest area of the lake using a "secchi" disk. Basically, you drop a black-and-white disk into the water when the sun is bright (but in the shade of the boat) and measure how deep you can still see it. On July 20th and again on September 6th, the water clarity was 15 feet. This is guite normal compared to other years, but well below 2013, when the test on comparable dates yielded 20 feet in early July and 19 feet in late August. In 2012, the clarity was 13 feet in early June, 15 feet in late June, and 17 feet in early July. We have found that rainfall, wind, boat activity, and air temperature can affect the water clarity. Overall, the water clarity of Half Moon Lake is still excellent.

Dissolved Oxygen:

The amount of dissolved oxygen available in a lake, particularly in the deeper parts of the lake, is critical to its overall health and fish population. Cold water holds more oxygen than warm water. In general, coldwater fish species (for example, walleye) need at least 5 parts per million of oxygen to survive. Northern pike need at least 4 ppm to survive, and sunfish (including largemouth bass) need at least 3 ppm. In contrast, warm-water fish species (such as common carp) need as little as 0.8 ppm to survive. On July 20th, dissolved oxygen was at 6.4 at a depth of 10 feet. Again, this is in line with the historical levels for our lake and conducive to the species in our lake.

Water Temperature:

Our official readings confirm what everyone that dipped their toe in Half Moon Lake this summer already knew: the lake wasn't very warm! On July 20th, the water temperature 5 feet below the surface was 72 degrees. This is in comparison to 2012, when the water temperature ten feet below the surface was 80 degrees! Although the water was pretty chilly during prime swimming days, it should be noted that on September 28th, the water could be considered swimmable — about as late in the year as I can remember!

All-in-all, the water quality of Half Moon Lake is holding steady and remains excellent!

Simple things you can do to help reduce phosphorus runoff to Half Moon Lake and nearby rivers & streams

- Use phosphorus-free dish detergent, laundry soap, and fabric softener; many brands are available.
- Keep leaves and grass clippings out of the water, roadside ditches and storm sewer drains.
- Pick up pet waste and dispose of it properly.
- Use phosphorus-free fertilizers.
- · Divert driveway and roof top runoff to an area where it can soak into the ground.
- Redirect your downspouts away from the lake or to a rain garden.
- · Minimalize impervious (hard) surfaces like rooftops, walkways and driveways on your property.
- · Properly maintain your septic system.
- Plant trees, native shrubs and grasses in place of turf to help capture rainwater and minimize runoff.

FISHING REPORT

Reports from around the lake seem to indicate that fishing in general, and walleye fishing in particular has been better than anyone expected. One of my "go to" fishermen said he caught several walleyes this year that were within the slot for keeping, but he released all of them in the hopes that they will reproduce and give us even more in the future!

Wayne Lemay from Breezy Bay said that the sunfish and crappie fishing has been pretty good also. As you can see from the photo, Scott Lessard has had exceptional luck with the approximately 27" beauty he caught and released the first part of September. He also said that last spring, he was boating several walleyes every time he went out, most of which went right back into the lake.



Scott Lessard, who lives next to Gores on the south end, caught this big walleye on 9-6-14! It was not weighed, but was almost 27 inches long- so let's say 26-7/8"

On a morning pontoon ride with John Weber, Jim Smith and Terry Radke in August, I witnessed a dead walleye near the dam that measured approximately 24".

We will again be receiving fingerlings next fall thru the DNR restocking program. The number should be similar to 2013, which was around 5,700. I hope to be able to witness the restocking next fall so I can have a first-hand look at how this is done.

Thanks to all who contributed info to share with everyone, and good luck fishing next year!




Meet Your Neighbor

The Webster dictionary defines a hero as " a man of distinguished courage or ability, admired for his brave deeds." A hero isn't always a President, King, or Queen of a country. Sometimes, it is just the neighbor next door.

Fred Krebsbach was not unlike many young men in the 60's. He had graduated from high school at Stacyville, Iowa - and headed to West Des Moines for school in electronics. Then, like so many, Fred received his draft papers for duty.

Before leaving for Vietnam, twenty-one year old Fred received a piece of advice from his uncle: carry something with you into combat that will give you comfort in a time of need. He figured it was worth a shot and chose his First Communion rosary. This turned out to be a lifechanging maybe even life-saving, decision.



Sent into combat as a M-60 machine gunner, for almost seven months Fred faced danger from booby traps, enemy combatants, and the jungle itself. After becoming injured and returning from the hospital, he gave up the M-60 to become a squad leader for Special Forces. He endured seven more months of constant change and surprise, but one companion was constant - a voice inside his head that helped him find the right course of action to keep him alive. To this day Fred doesn't know what it was exactly, but it may have had something to do with his rosary.


Though he survived Vietnam, Fred was changed in irrevocable ways. He was inspired by the WWII veterans - and this was his motivation in writing,"Okay Okay." He hopes his story helps his grandchildren and other young people understand the cost of combat and their value of thinking it through before engaging in war.

Fred and his wife, Marcia, have two daughters, Sara and Anne. They have five grandchildren. The family came to Half Moon Lake in 1990 and bought Harold and Helen Olson's cabin on Oscar Lane. They now spend half the year at the lake,

the other half in Rochester, Minnesota.

In Loving Memory




WARREN SMALLIDGE, SR.





TRUDI'S TIPS

GLASSMAN'S FAMOUS WILD RICE

Dave & Jennifer Glassman

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 1 lb. good bacon, diced
- 1 large yellow onion, diced
- 1 large green pepper, diced
- 1 can of mushrooms, drained
- 1 six lb. can of Canoe cooked wild rice, or 6 one lb. cans, drained
- 1 stick of butter
- salt and pepper to taste

Saute the diced bacon until done. In bacon grease, add the onion and pepper. Saute these until soft.

Add the mushrooms and the drained rice. Top with butter.

Be careful not to add too much salt when seasoning. Serves 15-20

This is everyone's favorite. Don't hesitate to make lots of this, it freezes well. and is handy for soups or sides later in the season.



- 1. MOISTURE METERS Stick a pine cone 2 petals deep in house plants. The petals will open when the plant is dry and close when the plant is wet. No more poking a finger into the dirt.
- 2. NO MORE FRUIT FLIES Start with a carry-out cup, lid and straw. Fill the cup 1/4 full with any cola, cover with the lid, and insert the straw to just above the cola. Let the straw stick out of the cup 1 inch. Fruit flies will go down the straw, and not come out. No more fruit flies around the basket of fruit on your counter.
