Ed. Note: This newsletter we debut a new column featuring a long time resident of the lake, as a way to meet your lake neighbors and learn about how Half Moon Lake has changed (or stayed the same) over the years.

Gordy and Eleanor Mommsen bought their property on the north end of Half Moon Lake forty years ago in 1969. Eleanor was from North Valley, a community west of Milltown, and they had heard that Half Moon was a particularly pretty, clean, and clear lake. The first few years, they cleared brush from their wooded lot, and brought up a camping trailer. A tin shed from Sears served as a changing room. They had also looked at existing cabins on the south end of the lake, selling at the time for \$35,000.

In 1971, the Mommsens went to an auction on Balsam Lake. A resort was selling off their cabins, and they bought a cabin for \$250.00 plus the cost of moving it. They had a foundation built, electricity installed, and Gordy himself put in a 30 foot driven well that they used until just a few years ago. Gordy described the cabin as a one season, "minimal" cabin, "There were big gaps in the walls – you could see daylight through them." None the less, the cabin served them well for twenty years, until 1991, when, on the eve of the infamous Halloween snow storm, they began construction of their current home.

HALF-MOON LAKE CONSERVANCY

Nine attended this meeting, hosted by Ellen Butler, Ellen shared the history of how and why the conservancy was formed. Ellen showed maps of the lake's water shed, Harder Creek, and talked about the many future projects. This group, in partnership with the Half Moon Lake District Board, is doing everything possible for the protection of our beautiful lake.

GUIDED TOUR OF HARDER CREEK David Butler guided five people through the new trails of Harder Creek. Many plant species were identified, and people learned about the importance of Harder Creek and Tamarack Bay National Preserve to the future health of Half Moon. This marked trail is always open to the public. The entrance is on Dau Road.



As I write this column - I'm looking at our beautiful Half Moon Lake. The docks and boats are gone, most cabins are closed, the loons have left, and the leaves have fallen - still, the beauty is awesome. November is a month of giving thanks - and like you, I'm so thankful for our "little slice of heaven."

It has been a very busy fall for all of us on the board.

At the annual meeting of the Half Moon Lake Protection and Rehabilitation District held on July 18,2009 - a homeowner made a motion to levy an assessment of \$20.00 per property to fund the purchase of fireworks for July 4, 2010. The motion was overwhelmingly approved by those in attendance. Following the meeting, several property owners raised the question of whether the action taken was valid, and whether the District Board of Commissioners was authorized to certify the levy to the County Treasurer. The vote was challenged on the basis that under state guidelines, proper notification was not given prior to the annual meeting. The second issue raised was, even if the action taken was proper, does the levy of a tax for the purchase of fireworks come within the lawful powers of the elector - as set out in Chapter 33 of the Wisconsin code.

We, as your 2009-2010 Board, have been working hard to get up to speed on what is means to be a district, sanctioned under Wisconsin statutes as a tax collecting entity. After many meetings, research, and much dialogue - our mission statement was created: "The purpose of a district is to maintain, protect, and improve the quality of a lake and its watershed for the mutual good of the members and the lake environment. Allocation of funds will be authorized with this mission in mind."

The board still had to wrestle with all motions made at the annual meeting. We felt we had two choices: 1) do nothing, and wait until 2010 annual meeting, or 2) honor all motions to the extent the statues allow, and that fit our mission statement.

With the threat of Aquatic Invasive Species looming - the first option was not viable. We need to proceed with all clean water projects for the good of all of us - and for our investments as lake homeowners. Therefore, the board voted to make a onetime only donation of \$1500.00 to the 2010 fireworks fund. If you would like to make a donation to this fund, please return the envelope enclosed in this newsletter.

A big thank-you to all those involved for the time and consideration given to all views, This issue has provided us an opportunity to "clean-up" our act, and make the necessary operational changes to fit state law - and better serve you - our membership.

Mark Saturday, July 17, 2010 on your calendars. Please attend this annual meeting of the Half Moon Lake Rehabilitation and Protection District so you may take an active part in your lake community.

I hope you enjoy reading every page of the new "LOON LINES." It is full of many interesting articles about our lake and its people. Also, do read-up on the committee reports. Thank you to the many good people, making good things happen on Half Moon Lake.

Use a 9x9 pan or double for a 9x13" pan. Combine and pour into pan:

4 cups chopped apples ½ cup brown sugar

2 Tbs. Tapioca ½ cup whipping cream

Moon Lake District for their support of the CBCW (Clean Boats/Clean Waters)


I am pleased to announce that we did not identify any Aquatic Invasive Species. Our lake was found to be full of healthy aquatic vegetation. If we remember that "weeds are to the lake like trees are to the forest" then you can understand how valuable the aquatic vegetation is to Half Moon Lake.

We will enter the collected data into the SWIMS Database (Surface Water Integrated Monitoring System). This is a Wisconsin DNR information system that holds chemistry (water, sediment), physical, and biological, and aquatic invasive data. All of the Wisconsin CBCW volunteers submit their findings into this database at the end of the year.

We recently completed and submitted the fall 2009 grant application for the Aquatic Invasive Species program to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. Unfortunately, the AIS 2009 fall grant proposal was denied. We will submit an application again in February with the vision to secure the funding for the 2010 season. It is very important that we continue to move forward in our initiative to monitor the lake and we are asking for volunteers for the 2010 season. One of the reasons we were denied is that we are not currently monitoring the boat launch and educating boaters as to the dangers of AIS. The Weed Rangers lake monitoring for AIS is only half of the CBCW program.

Thank you again for your support of the Clean Boats/Clean Waters Program. See you on the water next lake season.



The recorded history of Half Moon Lake is replete with stories about the high and low water levels of the lake and the ingenious methods used by people to slow or speed up the runoff into Harder Creek. In 1926 the Railroad Commission of Wisconsin held a hearing to determine the "natural" level of water to be maintained in Half Moon Lake. R. Ziesmer, owner of the land through which the outlet flowed, testified there were rocks and dirt that formed a ridge to hold back the water, but "someone constantly and persistently removed the rocks, made a channel, an open channel. I threw some back, and complaint was made that I was damming the lake". "These rocks were removed by some interested party, always done while I was absent from the place." "Before I bought the land the lake level was two feet higher."

Horace W. Gage, father of Clayton Gage, said, "The value of lake shore property depends to a large extent on the level of the water in the lake, and I am very desirous that you do something to raise the level". Mads Bank testified the

power plant in Balsam Lake needed a steady flow of water from Half Moon Lake to generate power so he was against restricting the natural flow as was Mr. Harder, a farmer down stream who needed water for his livestock. The township board members complained that a higher water level would wash out the newly built road running through the swamp along the south side of the lake. Charley Johnson, owner of the Harder Creek land north of the lake said his pasture would be "all spoil if they raise the lake". He said he used the land for pasture since 1917. "I took rocks out of the dam two times". He said they started to build a dam with stones in 1917 and I wrote to the Commission and said "if you raise that lake the land ain't good land."

An interesting tidbit. The transcript shows an Oscar Johnson testified at the hearing on behalf of Herman Gutzner, a mute who operated the amusement area at Sandy Beach. Oscar stated that Herman Gutzner was his father in law. Could this be the same Oscar Johnson that Oscar Lane is named after. I never heard of Oscar Johnson of Oscar Lane having being married.

HALF MOON LAKE FISHING -hosted by Chuck and Diane Erickson. Fourteen fishing enthusiasts attended this meeting. Much discussion about how fishing has changed over the years, what to do about future stockings, and possible taxing of lake fishing tournaments. Many ideas were then sent to the board for future study. A great get-together for all who attended.

MEMORIES AND HISTORY OF HALF MOON LAKE - Nineteen spent several hours sharing pictures and stories of the lake, Milltown, and Oscar Johnsona lake legend. Hosted by Sarah Sawyer, this small group must be an annual event. David Butler is collecting any historical information about the lake and area towns for a future book.
